Depending on your point of view one hundred years is a long time. In geological time it's nothing but in human terms it's a century and a lot can change. Recently Australian identical twins Flora Barrett and Winifred Hopes celebrated their 100<sup>th</sup> birthday having been born in 1913 in Western Australia. Both are well and still have enough breath to blow out their birthday candles. When asked what their secret to longevity was they said "don't smoke, don't drink and don't go out with bad men" and both claim to have some good years left yet. It's quite an achievement to have lived 100 years let alone as twin sisters.

Now I reflected on this unique event for some time and wondered what had transpired in their life time and what they might say of the world today. In December 1913 Arthur Wynnes new game called *word cross* is published in New York and is today's cross word puzzle.
